
## PorSFiS Newsletter

REPORT ON WESTERCON 31 By John Andrews

Westercon kicked off on Friday evening with an Ice Cream Social for the early arrivals, trying to live up to its second title of Westercong. A fair number of fans were there, as well as some of the pros, including the Guest of Honor, Poul Anderson. Harlan Ellison even stopped by for a short time, but wasn't around any other time during the con.

Things really got rolling the next day with the huckster's rooms and arts show open, and the panels and films and discussion groups going. (The hucksters area was the biggest I've ever seen, including two worldcons.) The various pros arrived during the day, among them, Niven, Pournelle, Randall Garrett, and M.Z. Bradley.

There were a large number of panels, and few were the common ones that seem to be held at every con. Two of the more interesting ones were "Space Opera Meets the Seventies" and "Ruling the Galactic Empire". There was also a cartoon contest between some pros and fans.

The Masquerade on Saturday night was done in the round, which allowed most of the people a good view of the proceedings. It was also well lit by sets of spotlights. (Though these spots proved to be somewhat dangerous when one of the contestants ran into one, causing a scene very similar to the famous WW II flag raising.) The contestants were numerous, especially including most of Darth Vader's family, himself, his mother, his son, his brother D. Vader of the IRS, and even one girl as the dark side of the Force that seduced him!

Instead of a banquet, (perhaps for good reason, the filksong "Bouncing Potatoes" was written after a particularly infamous Westercon Banquet) the con had a reception for the guests of Honor where they gaves their speeches.

On Monday they gave a special showing of Star Wars. Imagine, seeing Star Wars in a group of about 800 fans! They also showed The Wicker Man, which seems to have gained a following among film fans, though I'm not sure why, it's not that good. The rest of the film program was rather unusual, with very few of the well known films, and some really obscure ones. (Anyone ever heard of The 5000 fingers of Dr. T?)

On the whole, the con was pretty relaxed with few scheduling and time problems. (There was even time to eat and sleep!) But, I didn't get to a single room party!

If you need a ride or have one to offer, meet at the library at 2:00 for a car pool.


## WHY AND HOW TO BUY USED BOOKS

The least expensive way to build a science fiction library is to shop at the used book stores. If you seek a recently-published book, you could save thirty or forty cents by purchasing a used copy. You can save a substantial sum on older titles if you buy earlier editions. A book published in 1968, for example, might have originally cost  $95\phi$ ; today the same book in its latest printing probably costs \$1.95 new. A trip to the used book store might turn up an older copy marked  $60\phi$ , leaving you more cash for more books.

Used books often look as though they rode around in peoples pockets for ten years, but they are still readable. Indeed, some have tasteful cover art and certain interesting introductions that might have been deleted from later editions. Of course, some first printings have been deemed collectors items, and will be priced accordingly.

Make a list of books you want to read and bring it with you when you browse. Write down books you have heard or read about, or books you have read before and wish to add to your library. Nebula and Hugo award winners make good reading, as do anthologies. Sometimes the book covers look interesting. If you don't want to read a book right away, you can set it aside for future enjoyment.


