Book Review "A Game of Thrones"

When I saw George R.R. Martin had a new book published I grabbed it off the rack. I loved his Tuff Voyaging and have been waiting for more for a long time. But I quickly learned it was "an epic." I had to try three times before I got past the intro and prologue. And Chapter one. But perseverance paid off. And By chapter three I was beginning to grasp the shape of the world it was situated in.

It's certainly different from his early works, and a lot longer and more complex. The touch of the dire wolves and their distribution and eventual fate is good. Martin doesn't pull nay punches either. His world might be chock full of magic and oddball ghosties and things that go bump into the night, but his characters are flesh and blood, sweaty, dirty, ignorant and honorable in their turns. And they pay the prices for other's deeds just like has actually happened in such societies.

Wheels turn within wheels in his complex court and the bluff barbarian does not save the day, but rather ends up bad ended. Of all the complex characters I am most intrigued by Daneiris, the posthumous daughter of the deposed king and her very interesting marriage and her reaction to it. Still, good as the yarn is, I've found that I haven't been burning to read it and interruptions happened constantly.

But I probably will buy the sequel when it comes out. It's a big enough epic and complex enough society that I am interested and intrigued to see where it goes.



Book Review "Terrapin"

"Terrapin, or Captain Megaloman and his Trusty Sidekick Squidley Save the World Once Again" By Tilper Manaday Lithodendron, Seattle (2001). Trade paperback, 298 pp.

Sometimes, an unknown author will come out with a novel instantly recognizable as a classic. But sometimes, the unknown author comes out with a novel instantly recognizable as garbage. Usually, when the novel is published by an obscure press, straight to paperback, it is a strong indicator which category applies. In the case of "Terrapin, or Captain Megaloman and his Trusty Sidekick Squidley Save the World Once Again", unfortunately, the indicators are right.

In Terrapin, two neighbors, one an unemployed and probably unemployable engineer and the other a maladjusted investor, find a long-distance matter transmitter in a hitherto undiscovered room beneath the engineer's garden shed. The expected squabbles over whether to use it for The Benefit of Humanity, or to profit a bit in the process, or to play around with the universe, ensue, but aren't quite answered, as they attract the attention of the IRS, a television preacher, the U.S. Geological Survey, and the local self-appointed militia in the process.

The attempts at satire fall flat from heavy handedness and the numerous pop culture references, slightly tweaked to discourage trademark litigation, probably do no more than relieve Microsoft, Paramount, AOL Time Warner, and the like that their products were not accurately named.

It's hard to like a character who introduces himself with "`I'm

Squidley. I bought Picosoft.'" (p. 5) It's even harder to like writing that wallows in banal repetition and bad descriptions:

"Squidley couldn't sleep. It wasn't just the summer sausage, though that was certainly a part of it. It wasn't the religious programming on the television; right now it was some equal-time satan worship thingie except the babe on the altar was wearing a chaste bikini instead of being naked. He watched her for a minute and lost interest immediately. The summer sausage as more pressing, but that wasn't what kept him awake." (pp. 126)

There isn't much to recommend Terrapin. The use of a literal deus ex machina provided by aliens as a plot device, characters who only barely escape caricature, subplots that fail to affect the story or impact on the theme, if there is one, and blunderbuss attempts at humor that tend to more the blunder than the buss leave the reader under-whelmed long before the end. The combination fails even to achieve so-bad-it's-good status. The reader looking for rising talents in the SF world is advised to go elsewhere. If "Terrapin" is any indication, Tilper Manaday will not be among them.

Columbia Report – What we know now

At roughly 8am CST on February 1st, 2003, the space shuttle Columbia OV-102 suffered a catastrophic incident on re-entry that destroyed the vehicle and killed its crew of 7. NASA has launched an investigation into the incident, which is currently ongoing, and both NASA and the investigation team have released a number of reports to the public regarding the events of that Saturday morning on February 1st. Here is a summary of what is known so far.

Columbia was launched on its 28th mission, a "pure science" mission, on January 16th 2003, at 9:39am CST. On launch, an object which appeared to have broken off of the external tank was observed to strike the left wing underside area of the orbiter. The impact was observed during routine frame-by-frame analysis of the launch video the next day. NASA engineers analyzed the incident and provided reports. An internal NASA review identified several possible scenarios, none of which indicated heavy damage to the orbiter.

On February 1st, at 7:08am CST, Columbia performed a de-orbit burn using the OMS engines, standard procedure for re-entry. Entry initially appeared normal, but after a few minutes various sensors measuring temperature and pressure of various systems in the orbiter began showing anomalous readings. The majority of the sensors affected all had wiring that routed through the left side landing gear well, which seems to indicate that the landing gear well had been compromised. NASA now believes that plasma from the outside air penetrated the structure of the left wing and damaged the orbiter to the point of structural failure. Analysis of the 32 seconds of "corrupted" data before

complete loss-of-signal appears to indicate wing failure.

At this point, it is not known for sure whether the wing was damaged from the launch impact, or what the impacting material was. NASA believes that the material is insulation from the external tank, but various expert sources have speculated that the object in question may have been heavier insulation from the ET, or possibly ice buildup on the insulation, or from the propellant feed lines that run down the exterior of the ET to the orbiter.
