



## **Society Member Letters**

Dear Pulsar Editor,

06 March 2003

Re: your convention listing for Orycon 25. Have checked the perpetual calendar to insure that the date listed is a weekend and found that it is.

As I will not have time to access the con website I wonder if you could do me a favor and pass on the following questions:

- 1) Since I do not own one, will a time machine or portal be available as the year 200 is not accessible on Tri-Met? (Theirs operates forward only in the form of long waits and rides)
- 2) Will an advance site team insure that there are enough usable branches on the two trees for a three day habitation? (Five for con crew)

#### **Portland Science Fiction Society & Me**

When I move to Portland in 1995 I didn't know where the other Science Fiction fans were.

It took me a while to find them because they were in hiding.

My path came through "The Illustrated Store".

Some might recall it's location on East Burnside, but that was not it's first home. I don't know why I went to "Logan's Run" at the downtown Fox Theater [or The Movie Box - I can't remember which], but it was probably because it was the only theater in town showing it. Logan's run opened May 16, 1975 with a special showing in Los Angeles, when it opened in Portland, obviously a few months later I went to see it.

On my way to where I parked my automobile I passed by a store front, across the street from what is now The Galleria at 916 SW Morrison. Half of the block was parking lots, but there were a couple of buildings on the lot. One of the business's there was "The Illustrated Store". And there in front of me in the widow were science fiction books and other items. I tried the door. It was locked. [Looking in the Portland Telephone books, there was no listing for The Illustrated Store in 1976, in 1977 it was in SW Portland, and in 1978 it was 1808 East Burnside.]

I had to come back, and I did. I can't say that I was a big customer of Carl's, but I'd come in every once in a while and talk for a few minutes, then the store closed/moved. The City of Portland decided to raze the entire block and put up a parking structure, and this is what they did, it's called Morrison West. Carl moved to East Burnside into a little store front near the corner of 18th. I'm not sure exactly which month this happened.

When I found Carl's store again I'd go in and make myself a pest, finally in order to get people to stop pestering him about the science

fiction world and other fans, he dragged several of us fans together. The 'official' lore has it that PorSFiS began as a group on it's own just prior to us being asked to leave the store and create our own life about 1978.

In the early days there were about 10 of us. Marc Wells, his brother Roger, Debbie Cross, John Andrews and myself made the move from the store to Room C at the Multnomah County Library. Carl Bennett, Michael Garlock are two of the names that I remember that didn't, the other woman, her boyfriend and one other person didn't make the move and have disappeared into the lore of PorSFiS history. It should be noted that part of the reason the boyfriend and the other woman didn't make the move was because they were in a rock and roll band; even had a record pressed and went that way. Somewhere in my collection is that record, so one of these days I'll look for the names.

So just when did STAR WARS come out? It must have been summer 1977, if so the members of proto-PorSFiS [embryo-PorSFiS] did have discussions about the movie before it came out, but also after. We weren't organized enough to see it as a group, but did discuss the various symbolism involved in the film, from the thrusting light sabers, to the organically shaped space ships.

It would be a full year before we were asked to leave the Illustrated Store so that Carl could have a life. He was spending 7 days a week in the store, and desperately needed an escape, that plus the fact that we didn't purchase a significant amount of books from him perhaps lead to this suggestion on his part.

We schlepped away in the night, rebounded and found a home at Room "E" at the Multnomah County Public Library Central Branch. From this bastion of literature and sharing we grew in number until we didn't know any better, starting doing community outreach, also know as The Symposium, and then that other thing called OryCon, with side trips through CON-GENERIC, Westercon, etc.

#### GameStorm 2003

Game Storm The First was born in the fevered minds of a few hardy Portland gamers, and took its first breaths in the meeting room of the Clackamas Denny's at 224 and SE 82nd. Since then, it has wandered the wilderness, seeking hotel facilities, which do not think that Gaming Is The Spawn Of The Devil.

Game Storm 2003 camped out this yaron on the top floor of the DoubleTree Columbia River, the same as last year. Last year we were under the under the capable leadership of Aaron Curtis; this year Fearless Leader was John Williamson.

Our goal (not excluding interplanetary domination) was 400 members, surpassing last year's 297 by a comfortable 1/3; instead, we had over 480 (counting both full memberships and day passes), overshooting our target in true Stankovite fashion by over twenty per cent and last year's edition by over sixty percent. More space will surely be found for next year's con. Forward the Glorious Gaming Revolution, Comrades!

Since we had only 500 event-seats including panels, things got a little cozy at times (not to mention the Inevitable Air Conditioning Breakdown for two hours Saturday morning in the Rogue Room), but there was always seating for ad hoc gaming if there weren't seats in the prescheduled gaming sessions. The well-stocked gaming library, using games purchased by OryCon and Game Storm as well as loaners from Dave & Melanie Schaber and Aaron Curtis, has a pretty broad selection of all varieties of non-computer games.

Two hundred and eighty-six games or events were planned, including board, games, card games, role playing games, collectible card games, panels with industry expects and even a gamer's movie about gamers. There were seven dealers of various and sundry gamer's sundries, including three gaming publishers who demonstrated their wares nearly constantly. A custom embroidery shop offered while-you-wait customized garb, there was a dealer of Pretty and Pointy Things, and, well, there were two shops who sold, well, games (imagine that). Again, this was a 75% improvement over last year's offerings.

Two experienced industry professionals served as Guests of Honor. Peter Adkinson, doyen designer of AD&D 3E and one of the former leading lights of Wizards of the Coast, even ran a session of AD&D 3E, of which your humble editor can describe in greater detail, inasmuch as she went a-huntin' some orcs. Steve Long of Hero Games also illuminated some of the mysteries of his gaming universe. Both sparked fascinating discussions in the panels and games they led, as did other game and game module designers who attended, such as GURPS aficionado Brian Underhill.

Next year will surely include all the great things about this year, along with earlier publishing of gaming schedule and possibly even more features to amaze and amuse the hardened gamer. Another priority will be more space, for things did become just a wee bit crowded from time to time.

In summary, and con where you break even is a good con, and with the superb attendance by so many Cascadian gamers, Game Storm is rapidly growing a reputation of providing quality entertainment for gamers, and a whole lot more.
