## **Member News**

"Congratulations on passing the Foreign Service assessment."

At approximately 20:15 UTC on Wednesday, 12 March 2003, I was lead into an interview room at the Department of State's Assessment Center in Washington DC and told these words. This was the cumulation of eighteen months of introspection, debate, research, and, at times, simply figuring how to work with this particular system.

Our embassies and consulates are staffed with Foreign Service Officers and Foreign Service Specialists, plus nationals of the host country, Foreign Service Nationals. The Officers and Specialists are US Citizens, selected for their ability to live and work abroad and effectively represent the United States as much as for skills in their selected profession. Officers and Specialists are rotated between sites, staying at one embassy or consulate for a tour of two to four years. Thus, it is the Nationals who provide continuity to our embassies and consulates.

I applied for a total of three positions, two in information management and one in technical security. Of these, I received the congratulations and a conditional offer for the Information Management Technical Specialist (IMTS), specializing in telephone installation and maintenance. For this position, if I pass the remaining qualifications, I will be assigned to one of eighteen major embassies, from which I will travel extensively

to support the facilities in the general area.

I still must pass a medical clearance, a background check for a top secret security clearance, and then a final review. I was told to have a retest of part of my medical examination, so there may be a few issues. I will know more in a few weeks. After a very thorough security interview, I do not believe there is anything of concern in my background that is not already known. Nonetheless, it will take between six and eight months to finish the background check.

If this all works out, I will initially be sent to Washington DC for a few weeks of general training that all new Foreign Service employees receive. I will then receive additional training in my field of specialty, in the Washington, DC area. After that, candidates bid for open positions in their specialty, usually for an initial two-year assignment. Frankly, for my first tour, I would be game for most anywhere. I could even imagine being the only one bidding for an assignment that everyone else tries to avoid.

I filled out my initial application in late 2001. This application required a multi-page form plus essays on several technical questions, plus a brief autobiography. That application did not get beyond the initial review. However, I was advised to consider a related position, the IMTS, which ultimately proved successful. At a high-tech career fair, one of the few employers represented was the Department of State, recruiting for Foreign Service positions. I continued to review the Department of State on their web site. In late July, I sent in applications for the IMTS position and one for a technical security position.

I received a phone call about the IMTS position in late fall. On

Thursday, December 19, I received an emailed letter inviting me to an oral assessment for the IMTS position. Because I had changed my address, it took a while for the follow-up paperwork to reach me, but by early January I knew the date and time of the assessment, and had travel arrangements. I made of point of staying within walking distance of the assessment, to keep things simple. Meanwhile, I continued reviewing for the assessment and filled out their form for the security clearance, researching details of my life up to ten years back.

One March 11, I flew to Washington DC. Wednesday, I arrived at the assessment center in plenty of time; there were quite a few candidates in various phases of their respective assessments. I met a fellow candidate for the IMTS position. The first part was a written exercise, where I had to select one of several topics and then write an essay on it. After that, I was interviewed by a team of two examiners, on my ability to live and work overseas and my technical background. Frankly, by the time they were done, I was not expecting to pass, especially as most of the candidates that day apparently were being turned down. Thus those words of congratulations were a very pleasant surprise.

The remaining position was an anti-climax. After hearing absolutely nothing about the other application I had sent at the same time as the IMTS, I received an email inviting me to an assessment, to be held in Los Angeles; for this position, the examiners were traveling to various locations closer to the candidates. They held the assessment in a hotel, the LAX Embassy Suites to be exact--it took me a while to realize how appropriate that name is to the Foreign Service. Although I was more confident and felt I had done a better job with the

questions, this time I was turned down.

While this application process may seem complex, it actually is much simpler that the full application for many of the Foreign Service positions. For most of these, there is a separate, full-day written assessment. The candidates who pass then are invited to a full-day oral assessment. Although my assessment was called an oral assessment, it combined both the written and oral assessments, and each took about an hour rather than a full day.

Many years ago, in an organization that recreates the middle ages, I served as deputy minister of sciences and as a herald. This was the engineering and technology of the period, and the heralds were the ones who moved with diplomatic immunity across frontiers. I recently realized that, after passing the oral assessment, I am well on my way to doing, in real life, the twenty-first century's equivalent.

While at the assessment, I was aware that many of you, across the country and the world, were thinking of me and pulling for me, and that comforting thought made a significant difference. I must still meet rigorous medical standards, which may or may not prove a stumbling block, and a thorough background check as well as a final general assessment. Time will tell. The next few months should prove quite interesting, regardless of the final outcome.
