

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# **Forgotten Fantasies**

When is a trilogy not a trilogy?

Well maybe when it wasn't meant to be a trilogy and was marketed as such. Hope Mirless was an author difficult to research twenty years ago when I first read her "Lud in the Mist," Leslie Barringer is even more obscure. Like Hope he published but a little and that little not well known past the '20's of the last century. His lifespan was 73 years, 1895 to 1968. What little is know is found in the preface to the third book. He was a Quaker, born in England, and served in WWI as part of an ambulance unit. He later became an editor for an English publishing house, married and was the proud father of four daughters. None of his fantasies won the acclaim they merit and his three historicals were equally ignored. My next ambition is to track down copies of the historicals and read them also.

His "Neustrian Cycle" was not meant to be a trilogy; although the action



takes place in one world and one timeline; an alternate universe where dark ages Neustria becomes medieval France. The three books are quite distinctive, as well, in their themes.

"GerFalcon," treats of the troubles young "Ger," christened Raoul, son of a second son... and yet heir to Marckmont, a seaside fortress. His uncle, the firstborn son wishes him well dead. But it is not to be and soon enough Raoul comes to live at Marckmont with his cousin Charles and Robin, the sneering, sneaky child of his aunt. When they leave him alone in the castle whilst they go off to tourney, Raoul, in the manner of teenagers everywhere decides he cannot wait it out until his majority when he will take over his inheritance.

Follows his journey through Neustria, incognito, and his coming of age. Involved with a thief king, a highway man called Joris and his witch-queen Red Anne, Ger learns the lessons that all must learn to grow... in an appropriately medieval way.

The tale is complex and full, and involves treason on the part of his disliked uncle... The story leaves one quite satisfied as Ger finally routes his unwanted relatives and expels them from his domain and pledges his fealty to the king.

Although "Joris of the Rock" is billed as a sequel, it is not. Instead, it is the same time period, and a little before and after. But rather than tell the

Robber Baron's story, the named "Joris of the Rock," it tells the much more complex story of Red Anne, his mistress, and, surprisingly, for an author who told the noble side of the story so well, he now tells the story of the poor, the dispossessed, the mean, the fugitive in a medieval society. Without Ger to anchor the action, the book is of a different order. Anne is a character of great

strength and "smarts," yet, still a product of her time and involved in the complex tangles of her place and being. Barringer pulls no punches as to the difficulty of life in general for the under classes of a medieval kingdom or the particularly perilous position of females with power within it.

The third book, once again is not a sequel. "Shy Leopardess," changes the scene. Yolande, Duchess of Baraine, operates on a world one level above that of Ger, that of imperial politics. Orphaned by murder, betrothed by treason, imprisoned with malice aforethought, she manages to train herself enough to take out her "guardian" and his heir, and in the process gain for herself a considerable notoriety. Yet Yolande herself is but a simple child, who yearns for the sexual powers of the Byzantine empresses. She achieves that power and finds it no more what she expected than freeing herself from her captors... the satisfaction of a job well done. Ger makes a token appearance in this novel as her kinsman and one who will come to her aid if she can free herself from the legal tangle she is in.

Possibly Leslie's four daughters gave him the confidence to write such a strong woman and show her growing up and into her powers. All three books are now in print again and well worth the read.





# <u>Duologies vs. Trilogies</u> By Kier Salmon

At a recent Orycon meeting I heard an argument for calling SM Stirling's "Sea of Time" trilogy a duology with a wrap up book. Alternate history is one of my favorite genres of fantasy fiction and Stirling ranks high in my regard. The argument interested me enough to look into the triplet of books again.

Is it a duology or a trilogy? The chief "arguer" felt that the third book was really not even written happily by Stirling, but simply written to complete a contract. I don't think this is true, although I see where he could feel that way.

The "Nantucket" trilogy follows the adventures of people stranded when the Island of Nantucket is suddenly bounced back to a time just before the Trojan War. Proud Illium is vanguished in this timeline, also, but in a different manner.

The first book "Island in the Sea of Time," is the most cohesive and readable if one is looking for a "begin at the beginning, continue on through the middle and wrap it up at the end," kind of story. But a group of people, seven thousand or so, and mostly cantankerous New Englanders are not going to stay in a cohesive group very long. And Stirling doesn't try to make them. Instead, in each book he follows the main characters, who, during the first few days after the "event," take hold of the reins and begin to set into motion the different forms of governance that will guild their destiny in a very different world. From the speculations of how the British Isles evolved in this period, through the Greeks and Phoenicians, Stirling did a neat job of showing a world very different from our own. People's reactions and actions are very consistent... what can I say, if you've read it you either love it or hate it. And loving the first doesn't make you love the next two. Without giving away a large part of the plot, I found (as a person who grew up in Mexico) the sequence of events when the Island's anti-imperialists go to Mexico

to warn the Zapotecas and the Toltecas of the evil to the north... fore ordained. I winced, literally at that point in the narrative.

In the first book the Islanders consolidate their hold on their world and begin to expand in ways that seem correct to them.

In the second book, "Against the Tide of Years," they band together with various of the other nations in this more primitive earth to battle a renegade sociopath that came along with Nantucket. Walker has taken over Mycenae and most of Greece, humbling Odysseus to his yoke, and taking Helen and Hermione prisoner. Back home in



Nantucket, the Islanders begin to prepare for all out war. Walker is not blessed with the machine shops of the Islanders, but he made off with a considerable amount of technical information and one rather good smith.

Finally, in the last book of the series, "On the Oceans of Eternity," Stirling works with an increasingly unwieldy cast of characters and a sprawling geographical canvas, Stirling ties his knots and sets the loom for our imaginations to work on.

His knowledge of what little we know of ancient civilizations and his ability to put them together in believable human terms makes all of these books tinged with a gritty realism that offsets the heroic dimensions of his Nantucket characters.


